Practice Summary

Gus Waschefort practises in public international law and English public law. In his domestic practice, Gus specialises in public inquiries, and public law matters with a focus on complex cross-border dimensions involving public international law. In his international practice, he specialises in international dispute settlement before international and regional courts and mechanisms (including investor-state arbitration). Gus is a member of the Attorney General's Public International Law Panel Counsel (B Panel) and regularly acts for UK Government departments.

Gus is particularly sought after in matters requiring strategic navigation of the interface between international norms and domestic law, including disputes involving trade and investment law, national security, the defence industry, armed conflict, historical injustices, and environmental harm. He has extensive experience advising and acting in complex disputes, particularly in Africa-related matters. Gus has worked across Southern, East and West Africa and the United Kingdom.

Alongside practice, Gus maintains a strong academic profile and was most recently Associate Professor of International Law at the University of Essex. He is internationally recognised for his research and expertise in public international law, and particularly the application of international law in African contexts. He regularly advises governments, international organisations, and civil society across the African continent and beyond.

Public International Law and Dispute Settlement

Gus holds a PhD in public international law and has over eighteen years of experience as a public international law specialist. His recent international law instructions include:

- Member of the counsel team advising the Federal Republic of Nigeria in respect of 'Obligations of States in respect of Climate Change' (Request for Advisory Opinion), International Court of Justice.

- Instructed by the Bar Human Rights Committee of England and Wales to co-author an independent report titled 'Preliminary Review of the Kosovo Specialist Chambers: Structure, Function, Emerging Practice, and Legal Challenges' which was commissioned by the Ombudsperson Institution of Kosovo.

- Member of the counsel team acting for a party to an ongoing matter before the European Court of Human Rights.
- Instructed to draft and file several submissions to UN treaty bodies and special procedures.
- Instructed by the New Lines Institute for Strategy and Policy to advise on international accountability mechanisms in respect of state sponsored drug trafficking.
- Advising on the sanctions regimes of the EU, US and UK.
- Drafting submissions to the Office of the Prosecutor of the International Criminal Court in terms of Article 15 of the Rome Statue.
- Providing bespoke training and strategic engagement regarding a range of public international law matters in the UK and internationally.

In addition to his work in practice, Gus is a frequent speaker at leading international law conferences, roundtables and symposia, as well as universities. Recent examples include presentations and lectures delivered at Harvard Law School (2024); Vanderbilt Law School (2024); the Annual Meeting of the American Society of International Law (2022 & 2025); and the U.S. Military Academy at West Point (2022). Between 2010 and 2013 Gus served as legal advisor to the UN Special Rapporteur on extrajudicial, summary or arbitrary executions.

International Dispute Settlement in Africa

Gus, who first qualified in South Africa, has maintained a career long focus on Africa and the continent's evolving geopolitical landscape. His understanding of the legal and political challenges facing African states is underpinned by his experience working in more than twenty African countries, engaging directly with governments, regional institutions, civil society actors, and international organizations.

Through research, teaching, and policy engagement, Gus contributes to advancing informed dialogue on Africa's place in international law and global politics. His work is valued for its combination of doctrinal rigor, contextual awareness, and sensitivity to the diverse legal and political experiences across the African continent.

Gus accepts instructions in relation to international and cross-border dispute settlement across Africa.

Inquiries

Gus is instructed on an ongoing basis by the Government Legal Department (GLD) for the Ministry of Defense in the Independent Inquiry relating to Afghanistan (led by Brian Altman KC and Melanie Cumberland KC). Gus is instructed specifically as a Law of Armed Conflict specialist and plays a leadership role within a large counsel team. Additionally, Gus is instructed on an ongoing basis for the Home Office in the Undercover Policing Inquiry (led by Neil Sheldon KC)

Administrative and Public Law

In his domestic public law practice, Gus focuses on judicial review proceedings with acute public international law elements. Most recently, he was instructed by the GLD for the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) in a rolling judicial review challenging decisions by the UK Government in respect of migrants who arrived in the British Indian Ocean Territory (led by Ed Brown KC).

Human Rights and Civil Liberties

Gus is an internationally recognized expert in international children's rights, the African Human Rights System and the UN Human Rights System. He has more than fifteen years' experience working at the forefront of international human rights practice, including advising UN mechanisms in real time on matters such as the killing of Osama bin Laden, and leading large-scale investigations into the commission of war crimes. His book 'International Law and Child Soldiers' (2015) remains a leading text on children in armed conflict, and he has extensive experience working in-country on critical issues of International Human Rights Law and the Law of Armed Conflict, including in Afghanistan, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Liberia and South Sudan. He is equally experienced in working with UN mechanisms in Geneva and New York.
